From the Desk of Emil Fish Founder of the Bardejov Jewish Preservation Committee



As many of you know, I founded the Bardejov Jewish Preservation Committee in 2006 to preserve Bardejov's Jewish heritage by restoring the Jewish cemetery and the Jewish Suburbia, which for decades lay neglected and deteriorating; memorializing the 3,000-plus Jews from Bardejov who perished in the Holocaust; and raising awareness of the rich contributions of the Jews to Jewish and Bardejov history. We have restored the cemetery, laying new foundation under each headstone, and have posted the information for each stone on our website.

We continue to achieve success, and to diligently pursue, our mission. The May 2012 commemorative gathering and reunion in Bardejov brought together Bardejovers, their descendants, and friends from around the world. Old relationships were strengthened and new ones were formed. The event received extensive media coverage in Slovakia and internationally and has helped to set the stage for the committee's ongoing and future projects.

I look forward, with your help, to achieving all our goals in the years to come and hope to hear from you soon.

MEMORIAL GARDEN CONSTRUCTION BEGINS Mr. Charles V. Roven and Mr. Thomas Spiegel Make It Possible

he Bardejov Jewish Preservation Committee is pleased to announce the largest contribution toward the building of the Bardejov Holocaust Memorial Garden. Mr. Charles Roven and Mr. Thomas Spiegel-descendants of Bardejov families that date from the eighteenth century-have committed \$180,000 on behalf of their foundations to the memorial project. With this generous gift from the Charles V. Roven Family Foundation and the Roven-Spiegel Charitable Foundation—and with all the official permits now in place—we are ready to break ground and begin construction in the spring of 2013, as soon as weather permits, with a projected completion date of late summer.

JEWISH SUBURBIA UPDATE

iscussions are underway between the City of Bardejov, the Bardejov Jewish Preservation Committee, local Bardejov advocates, and the Central Union of Jewish Communities in Slovakia (UZZNO) to vacate the Beith Hamidrash and the Mikvah in the Jewish Suburbia and to create a museum in the Beith Hamidrash dedicated to Bardejov's Jewish history. It is the committee's hope that in the near future the Jewish Suburbia will be completely restored and that, together with the newly built Holocaust memorial honoring Bardejov's lost Jewish community, these buildings will become a cultural and educational center for both Jews and non-Jews.

United States Holocaust Memorial Museum Visits Bardejov

In September 2012, the head of the Slovakian Witnesses Documentation Project of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., Mr. Nathan Beyrak, visited Bardejov. Pavol and Peter Hudak, our associates in Bardejov, took an active role in conducting video interviews with non-Jews about the fate of Bardejov's Jewish community. Four elderly residents provided testimonies about the Holocaust era and Bardejov's pre- and post-war periods. These oral histories will become part of the museum's audiovisual collection, accessible to anyone who wants to study Bardejov's Jewish history.

Peter Hudak Honored

On August 26, 2012, the Jewish community in Komarno, Slovakia showed its appreciation to Peter Hudak by awarding him the KEHILA-haver díj 2012-5772 for his work on behalf of Jewish communities at the regional level. Hudak also won the Student of the Year 2012 award for his efforts to document and research Bardejov's Jewish community and to preserve the town's Jewish heritage. Through their workshops and lectures, Peter and his father Pavol are gaining a reputation as the foremost local scholars of Jewish studies.

Spreading the Word

In Kosiče, a large group of Bardejovers most of them seniors—often meet together to reminisce. When they heard about recent events at the Jewish Suburbia, they invited Pavol Hudak to speak to them about our May 2012 reunion and the fate of Bardejov's Jewish community. It was an emotional exchange, as names of Bardejovers were called out—many of them neighbors and classmates. We hope the excitement of hearing news about their old friends will inspire these seniors to attend future Bardejov reunion events.

Slovak Holocaust Seminar at Yad Vashem

On December 2–10, 2012, our Peter Hudak joined 22 Slovakian educators at Yad Vashem to participate in a seminar for teaching the Holocaust to non-Jewish students. His certificate of completion will facilitate plans to establish an official Holocaust and Jewish history curriculum in Bardejov's elementary and high schools. Following the seminar, Peter conducted research about Bardejov at the Yad Vashem archives and Heichal Shlomo in Jerusalem, where he discovered many items from the Old Synagogue, documents and photographs, and 56 audio testimonies.
